Sharing Some of Our Learning & Writing With You.

FOCUSING ON MIDDOT FOR SEFIRAT HA'OMER

Throughout the period of Sefirat Haomer, we have been focusing on one middah each week. So far we have learned about and practiced the middot of Chessed (kindness), Gevurah (strength), and Tiferet (empathy and compassion).

This week we focused on the midda of Netzach which means persistence and not giving up. By looking at examples of GROWTH MINDSETS and FIXED MINDSETS, the Tamim learners were able to articulate times when they also had shown persistence with a Growth Mindset.

Talk about these statements at home and decide if they are green GROWTH MINDSETS (that help us grow) or red FIXED MINDSETS (that stop us from growing).

This will never get better. | I think I need to try again. | How can I make this better? I can't play any sports. | That activity looks exciting, but it's too hard for me. I can do this and will put in the effort. | I'll never get this right. | Is this my best work? This mistake will help me grow. | I give up. | I'm bad at math. | I can't read very well. I'm not good at this. | I think I need to try a different strategy to figure this out. I'll never be able to draw like her. | This may take some time to learn, I'll keep trying! Can you think of some more growth and fixed mindset statements with your family?

"I did not finish my math works in time, so I just did it later in school." (Oscar)
